HOW DOES PIP BENEFIT OUR COMMUNITY?

Recipients of parole in place will be protected temporarily from deportation, be able to **apply** for legal work authorization, and could potentially complete their application process for lawful permanent residency.

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NOTE: Additional information on the application process, required fee, and other key information will be detailed in a forthcoming Federal Register Notice. USCIS will reject any filing received prior to the publication of the Federal **Register Notice.**

ELIGIBILITY AND PROCESS



USCIS will consider an individual's eligibility on a case-by-case basis.

Spouses of U.S. citizens must:


- Be present in the United States without admission or parole;
- Have been continuously present in the United States for at least 10 years as of June 17, 2024;



- Have a legally valid marriage to a U.S. citizen as of June 17, 2024; and
- Have no disgualifying criminal history or otherwise constitute a threat to national security or public safety

Stepchildren of U.S. citizens must:

- Be present in the United States without admission or parole; and
- Have a qualifying stepchild relationship to the U.S. citizen as of June 17, 2024



WHAT YOU CAN DO NOW:

- Schedule a legal consultation with a trusted legal service organization or immigration attorney to be informed of your options
- Gather documents The following are only recommended documents. USCIS has not yet published what documents will be necessary.

Applications for the new parole in place program <u>will</u> open on **August 19, 2024**.

PROTECT YOURSELF FROM IMMIGRATION SCAMS

Applying for this – or any other immigration benefit – carries some risk. A person who applies and does not qualify and/or includes inaccurate information in an application could face negative immigration consequences including: denial of benefits, loss of filing fees, ineligibility for future benefits, and/or referral for deportation proceedings.

Some common scams to be aware of include:

- Government Impersonators: USCIS will only contact you through official channels, not via personal social media accounts.
- Scam Websites: Ensure information comes from uscis.gov, dhs.gov, or affiliated .gov sites.
- Payments by Phone or Email: USCIS will never ask for money transfers via Western Union, MoneyGram, PayPal, or gift cards, nor request payment by phone or email.
- **Unauthorized Practitioners:** In the U.S., only attorneys or DOJ-accredited representatives can offer legal immigration advice.





Please, keep the following points in mind:

- No attorney or legal service provider can promise you an outcome on your case. Because we don't have final instructions from the government, it remains unclear who will qualify for this benefit.
- Because the government has not yet released the full requirements for this program, no one can promise you are eligible for this benefit or guarantee you will be able to receive an employment authorization document. While some attorneys may ask for a fee to assess your case and/or be under contract with you to complete your application if you are eligible, be careful about paying for legal services for PIP at this time.
- Avoid fraud by notaries and other unlicensed providers. Only licensed attorneys and accredited representatives who work at recognized nonprofit organizations can provide a legal assessment of your case or offer you legal services.
